About the Show

Share this synopsis with your students prior to beginning Activity One: **Hairspray LIVE!** is the story of Tracy Turnblad, a teenager with big hair and big dreams. Despite the objections of her stay-at-home mother, Edna, Tracy becomes an overnight sensation when her dance moves win her a role on The Corny Collins Show, a teen dance show on local TV. Tracy's talent also wins the heart of Link Larkin, the show's dreamboat. Her success stirs the envy of Amber Von Tussle and her mother Velma, who see Tracy as Amber's rival for the title of Miss Teenage Hairspray. But Tracy has bigger plans! Before long she's leading a campaign to integrate the all-white Corny Collins Show. Tracy teams up with Seaweed, an African American boy who shares her passion for dancing. And she has the help of Seaweed's mother, Motormouth Maybelle — a record store owner who shares Tracy's vision of social justice. Together, they finally break down the color barrier that divides the show's dance floor and prove that we all dance to the same beat.

ACTIVITY ONE Welcome to the 60's!

Schedule this activity for December 6th to generate enthusiasm for staging a 60's Day in class that will build anticipation for watching **Hairspray LIVE!** on Wednesday, December 7th, at 8/7c on NBC.

Everybody's Rockin'! introduces the main characters of **Hairspray LIVE!** with a matching quiz. Use the synopsis above to familiarize students with the show before they complete the quiz, then review the answers in class. Answers: 1-D, 2-F, 3-H, 4-A, 5-G, 6-B, 7-E, 8-C.

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Signs of the Times gets students excited about the iconic decade when **Hairspray LIVE!** takes place by inviting them to compare the styles, music, and social issues of the 60's with those of today. Have students work in pairs or small groups to fill in the graphic organizer by researching the 60's online and brainstorming equivalent signs of our times. Then allow time for students to share what they have learned in a class discussion. Follow-up by discussing how the personalities and relationships that make up the teen world of **Hairspray LIVE!** compare with teen life today.

60's Day! challenges students to warm up for their in-class 60's Day by learning some dance steps from that swinging era. Visit the **Hairspray LIVE!** microsite at **ymiclassroom.com/hairspray** for links to videos showing 60's dances like the Twist, the Mashed Potato, the Pony, the Monkey, the Hitch Hike, the Jerk, the Swim, and the Madison. Tell students they will be looking for these dances when they watch **Hairspray LIVE!** with their families.

Bring the 60's to Life in Your Classroom!

Build anticipation for the December 7th broadcast of **Hairspray LIVE!** at 8/7c on NBC by having students come to class that day dressed in 60's styles and ready to rock to 60's tunes. Use the additional activity ideas on page 4 of this guide to explore the exuberant songs and dances of that era and the ideals that made it a transformative period in American history.

ACTIVITY TWO We All Dance to the Same Beat!

Distribute this activity sheet at the end of your 60's Day on Wednesday, December 7th, so that students can use it while they watch **Hairspray LIVE!** with their families that night at 8/7c on NBC. Review all parts of the activity sheet in class so that students will be prepared to come back and discuss the show on Thursday.

Get in the Groove provides lyrics to several songs in **Hairspray LIVE!** so that students and their family can sing along. This part of the activity also highlights some important themes of the show by asking students to match each song with its theme. When students bring the sheet back to class, review the themes students have assigned to each song and explore how these and other songs from **Hairspray LIVE!**, although rooted in the time and circumstances of the show's plot, express values and ideals we still hold today. Answers: 1-C, 2-A, 3-B, 4-E, 5-D.

This part of the activity also asks students to write a short paragraph on the back of the sheet describing how one of the show's themes is embodied by a historical figure, celebrity, family member, or some other role model whom they admire. Invite students to share their paragraphs in class the next day and discuss how a song can take on added meaning when it reflects some aspect of real life.

Teens Forever! turns **Hairspray LIVE!** into an intergenerational learning experience by having students ask their parents about their own teen years and how they compared with the world of the teens portrayed in the show. Encourage students to take notes on their interviews, on the back of the activity sheet or in a notebook, so they can share what they learn back in class. Use their findings to explore how teen styles, interests, and attitudes have changed since their parents' day.

Shimmy and Shake! focuses on the choreography of **Hairspray LIVE!**, encouraging students and their parents to get up and get in on the fun by dancing along with the stars of the show. Students are also asked to note any 60's dances they saw in the show. Have students share their dance notes in class the next day, and invite them to demonstrate some of the steps they picked up.

Hairspray LIVE! takes us back to a time when teenagers were creating a culture of their own, with their own ways of talking, dressing, and having fun. Talk with your parents about how their teen years compared with those of the kids in the show. What was their favorite music? What were the popular hair styles, fashions, and dances? What were some social issues they cared about? Take notes to share what you learn in class.

Shimmy and Shake!

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The Hits Keep on Coming

Use these activity ideas to extend your study of the 60's during your **Hairspray LIVE!** 60's Day or to supplement the lessons outlined in the activity sheets.

Embracing Differences

Just before she sings "Welcome to the 60's," Tracy tells her mother, Edna, "People who are different, their time is coming." Tracy's words of encouragement not only help inspire Edna to overcome her insecurity about appearing in public, but they also express an important theme of **Hairspray LIVE!** Use this line of dialogue as a prompt to have students write a one-page profile describing how they are different and what makes them unique.

Sounds of the 60's

Dozens of songs from the 60's are still part of pop culture today. Use a music streaming app or search Youtube to see which of these iconic 60's tunes your students can identify by title or by the name of the band that made the song famous: Little Eva, "Locomotion" (1962); The Ronettes, "Be My Baby" (1963); The Beatles, "She Loves You" (1964); Simon and Garfunkel, "The Sounds of Silence" (1964); The Rolling Stones, "(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction" (1965); The Who, "My Generation" (1965); Bob Dylan, "Mr. Tambourine Man" (1965); The Temptations, "My Girl" (1965); The Beach Boys, "Good Vibrations" (1966); James Brown, "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag" (1966); Aretha Franklin, "Respect" (1967); Jefferson Airplane, "Somebody to Love" (1967); Jimi Hendrix, "Purple Haze" (1967); The DODOON

Doors, "Light My Fire" (1967); Marvin Gaye, "I Heard It Through the Grapevine" (1968). For an added challenge, mix in some songs from the 1970's to see if students can tell the difference: for example, Carole King, "I Feel the Earth Move" (1971); Elton John, "Rocket Man" (1972); The Bee Gees, "Stayin' Alive" (1977). Discuss how the sounds and themes of 60's songs compare to popular songs today.

Let's Dance!

As their names reveal, many of the dance steps that became fads in the 60's were based on imitation. The Swim, the Hitch Hike, and the Twist are all simple motions set to a rock-and-roll beat. The Pony, the Monkey, and the Fly turn animal motions into dance steps. Visit **ymiclassroom.com/hairspray** for videos of these dances and have students compare them to dances popular today, like The Dab, The Wop, and The Shmoney. Then invite students to create their own new imitative steps for today's music. Some ideas for starters: The Texter, The Selfie, or The Video Gamer.

Blast from the Past

The turning-point in **Hairspray LIVE!** comes midway through the musical when Tracy organizes a march to protest the exclusion of African American teens from The Corny Collins Show, except on a monthly "Negro Day." Tracy and her friends wind up in jail, as did many other protesters during the 60's, but local demonstrations like hers played an important part in the Civil Rights Movement. Have students investigate the broad impact of some landmark local protest events such as the 1955 Montgomery Bus Boycott, which began when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat and move to the back of the bus; the **1960 lunch** counter sit-in at Greensboro, North Carolina, during which four college students sat in the "whites only" section of a lunch counter and refused to leave until they were served; and the 1961 Freedom Rides, when African American and white activists rode buses into the South to protest racial segregation at bus depots.
